THE 'ART' OF MANAGING CHALLENGING CHILDREN BEHAVIOUR

Assalamu alaikum

Throughout my career as a counsellor specializing in family dynamics, I have observed that children can typically be divided into two distinct categories based on their personality traits and behaviour patterns:

- The first group comprises of children who are generally affectionate, amiable, and cooperative with others. They are compliant and find it easy to follow instructions and are relatively undernanding. Parents typically find these children easy to manage and are pleased with their progress.
- On the other hand, the second group consists of children who are more independent-minded, spirited, and headstrong. They may be more challenging to handle for parents and caregivers, as they tend to be more vocal about their likes and dislikes and have a strong will of their own. While this may cause some frustration and even anger at times, these children often possess strong leadership qualities that can be nurtured and developed into great leadership skills later in life.



It is essential to understand these personality traits and behaviours in children and work with them to develop their strengths, regardless of which group they belong to. By recognizing and acknowledging these differences, we can help children learn to manage their emotions, build positive relationships with others, and develop the skills they need to become successful individuals in the future.



The question then arises: How do we manage the tricky children?

Managing tricky children can be made easier by following some golden rules that help minimize their negative behaviour:

- Tricky children seem to have a never-ending supply of energy which they use to put up a good fight, even against adults. As a result, parenting can be challenging. In such situations, it is wise for parents to focus on a limited number of areas they want to have a positive impact on, rather than trying to do too much at once. To achieve this, parents should identify one or two specific behaviours they want to address. It is generally a good idea to choose one behaviour that they would like to promote and encourage more of it, and one behaviour that they want to try to lessen. Then stick to those two behaviours for a minimum of six weeks. For example, if a child tends to be argumentative and refuses to listen to their parents, it may be helpful to focus on promoting positive communication and active listening skills.
- Tricky children tend to enjoy intense situations, such as drama, soap operas, grunge, gore, horror, and action. They are often skilled at creating drama and excitement in their lives. As they are accustomed to experiencing a lot of intensity, it becomes their natural state. Therefore, drama and excitement are like home to them.

As an advice to parents, I always suggest that arguing with a tricky child is like mud-wrestling; both parties end up getting dirty, but only the child is pleased. If you truly want to help your child learn to behave in a more diverse manner, please avoid provocative questions that lead to arguments.

Example of provocative questions include:

- "Have you got any homework?"
- "Have you cleaned your room?"
- "How many times do I have to tell you?"
- "What were you thinking?"
- "Can explain why your report looks like this?"



These types of questions will spark off a debate and conflagration that will last for hours.





Turn provocative questions into definite, clear statements. Some examples are:

- "Ok, it's homework time."
- "Let's get the room cleaned up before dinner."
- "I would like to remind you of our agreement."
- "Let's chat about how to help you with school."

This leads us to the next golden rule: **Many parents of challenging children** find routines to be more effective than words.

In recent decades there seems to have been a tendency for parents to feel they need to explain everything to their children. This might work well for some children, but tricky children often don't stick around long enough to hear the words. With tricky children, what you do is more important than what you say.

Research has shown that small family rituals have a powerful positive impact on family life. Every family has their own unique set of rituals, but it's common for these rituals to slip over time. If you find your family rituals slipping, consider starting new ones. Here are some examples of family rituals:

- Spending Friday nights together at the mosque and listening to lectures from scholars
- Swimming together on Saturday mornings
- Playing sports together on Sundays
- Having family gatherings
- Allowing your child to invite their friends over for a few hours each month.



Developing resilience is the ability to navigate through the challenges of life with ease. Children and adolescents can develop resilience when they have the following:

- A sense of being loved and supported by their family.
- · A diverse group of Muslim friends and
- An adult outside of their family who practices Islam and cares for them.



Finally, making dua (supplication) for your children's well-being, guidance, and righteous conduct is of utmost importance. Seek Allah's help in managing challenging situations.

Abu Hurayrah رضي الله عنه narrated that the Prophet ﷺ said: Three supplications are undoubtedly answered:

- 1) the Du'ā of a father
- 2) the Du'ā of a traveller and
- the Du'ā of the opressed.
 (Abū Dawūd)

As we are concluding the year, it is with great pleasure that we share details about our wellbeing program for the girls' wing (Year 7-12), centered around the practice of mindfulness. In a world busy with so many activities and demands, taking a moment to pause and cultivate mindfulness becomes an essential aspect of nurturing our mental, social and emotional well-being.

Throughout the term, we have presented a series of Mindfulness topics and activities to give our students and staff the opportunity to engage in simple yet powerful mindfulness discussions and exercises. These topics are designed to explore the benefits of mindfulness and provide a space for the students to learn how to reduce stress, improve their focus, and heightened self-awareness. This program also encourages contemplation, relaxation, and promote a sense of balance throughout our busy life.

We had the opportunity to learn about the Islamic perspective of mindfulness through the legacy of Al-Ghazali, as we learnt and discussed about the three types of Nafs: An-Nafs al-Ammārah (the depraved, commanding nafs), An-Nafs al-lawwāmah (the accusing nafs), An-Nafs al-muṭma-innah (the peaceful nafs). Also, we learnt about Al-Ghazali's concepts of purifying the soul and its relation to mindfulness.





Mindfulness practices have been shown to enhance overall well-being and resilience. We encourage our students, staff, parents, and our community to reflect on the positive moments, fostering a sense of appreciation for the journey we've collectively undertaken this year.

preconceptions!








Literacy and Numeracy Blocks:

Students were given time to explore their creativity by making things from play dough, felt-it materials, and weaving paper mats! The outcomes of their finished products are commendable!





























YEAR 6: THE SMOOTHIE BAR




YEAR 7A: SIMPLE MACHINES

YEAR 9: SOLAR OVEN PROJECT

Year 9 Science students have been learning about methods of heat transfer and conductors and insulators. They were tasked with the engineering process to design, build and test a solar oven.

Students were given the following briefing:

Many people around the world don't have access to electricity or gas. To cook their food, they often need to collect wood and light a fire. The smoke produced by cooking fires can cause serious health problems, especially for women and children. Thankfully, there's a safer alternative that relies only on radiant heat from the Sun. Solar ovens collect sunlight and use it to heat food. They may take longer than traditional ovens, but they can be just as effective. Some can even cook for hundreds of people at a time!

Their design brief was to Design a solar oven that can melt a fun-sized chocolate bar in 1 hour or to raise the temperature of water using sunlight as the heat source. Students did a wonderful job and all solar ovens were successful in raising the temperature of water or melting a bar of chocolate. Well done Year 9A and 9B students!






VCE RESULTS 2023



"The Futsal for the Islamic Schools was an event I really enjoyed. I had to put in a lot of effort to get into the futsal team.


