RIGHTS OF PROPHET MUHAMMAD ﷺ – PART 2

The Second Right: To Revere and Honour him

Another right of the Prophet ﷺ is that he is revered, respected and honoured. This can be carried out in two ways:

1. Sending Ṣalāh and Salām upon Him Abundantly

Allah ﷻ says:

“Surely, Allah and His angels send blessings to the Prophet. O you who believe, send your benedictions upon him and salute him with a goodly salutation (prayer for his being in peace) to him in abundance.”

(Qur'an 33:56)

In this verse, Allah ﷻ first declares that He Himself sends blessings upon the Prophet ﷺ, and that His angels do the same, before commanding the believers to follow. This sequence powerfully establishes the exalted rank of the Prophet ﷺ: the act required of the Ummah is already being performed by Allah ﷻ and His angels. Through this, believers are invited to participate in an act linked to the Divine and the angelic realm, nurturing reverence, love and obedience within their hearts.

When attributed to Allah ﷻ, Ṣalāh signifies His mercy, honour and praise for the Prophet ﷺ. This honour is manifested in this world through the elevation of the Prophet's ﷺ mention, that his name is mentioned along with the name of Allah Almighty, the global spread and preservation of his Sharia, and the obligation upon humanity to follow his guidance until the Day of Resurrection. In the Hereafter, it reaches its culmination in the granting of al-Maqām al-Maḥmūd, the highest station of intercession.

The Ṣalāh of the angels represents their supplication on his behalf, while the Ṣalāh of the believers combines sincere prayer with praise and recognition of his rank. Salām denotes peace, safety and protection from all deficiency and harm. Although the family and companions of the Prophet ﷺ are included in these blessings, their share remains proportionate and subordinate to his unique and supreme status.

When the Companions sought clarification on how to fulfil this divine command, the Prophet ﷺ personally taught them the prescribed formula of *Ṣalāh* upon him and his family:

اللَّهُمَّ صَلِّ عَلَى مُحَمَّدٍ، وَعَلَى آلِ مُحَمَّدٍ، كَمَا صَلَّيْتَ عَلَى آلِ إِبْرَاهِيمَ، إِنَّكَ حَمِيدٌ مَجِيدٌ
اللَّهُمَّ بَارِكْ عَلَى مُحَمَّدٍ، وَعَلَى آلِ مُحَمَّدٍ، كَمَا بَارَكْتَ عَلَى آلِ إِبْرَاهِيمَ، إِنَّكَ حَمِيدٌ مَجِيدٌ
(Bukhari)

This wording has since become the established Sunnah within the prescribed prayers. While this formulation carries exceptional virtue and reward, the obligation of *Ṣalāh* and *Salām* is not restricted to it alone. It is fulfilled through any expression that clearly conveys blessings and peace, such as صَلَّى اللَّهُ عَلَيْهِ وَسَلَّمَ.

The spiritual merit of this act is immense. The Messenger of Allah ﷺ said:

“If anyone invokes a blessing on me once, God will grant him ten blessings, ten sins will be remitted from him, and he will be raised ten degrees.”
(Nasa’i)

Although one utterance of *Ṣalāh* may suffice in a single sitting, repeating it at every mention of the Prophet ﷺ is strongly encouraged. This was the consistent practice of the scholars of ḥadīth in both speech and writing.

The Prophet ﷺ warned:

“The miser is the one in whose presence I am mentioned but he does not supplicate for me.”
(Tirmizi)

In both speech and writing, *Ṣalāh* and *Salām* should be conveyed in full and not abbreviated. The most complete practice is to combine both together. According to the majority of scholars, the term *Ṣalāh* is reserved exclusively for prophets, though others, such as the Prophet’s ﷺ family and companions may be included alongside him within the same supplication. For non-prophets, the appropriate expressions are prayers for forgiveness and divine pleasure.

2. Praising Him and Mentioning Him with Respect

Reverence for the Prophet ﷺ also requires care in language and conduct. Believers are instructed to address and mention him only with clarity, dignity and respect, avoiding expressions that may carry ambiguity or potential disrespect.

Allah ﷻ says:

“O those who believe, do not say ‘Ra ‘ina’ رَاعِنَا, but say ‘Unẓurnā’ انْظُرْنَا, and listen. And for the unbelievers there is a grievous punishment.”

(Qur'an 2:104)

Some among the rebels deliberately used the word *Rā ‘inā*, which in Arabic appears polite, meaning “*be considerate of us*” or “*give us your attention*”, but in their language carried an insulting connotation. They exploited this ambiguity to mask disrespect as courtesy. When some Muslims unknowingly adopted the term in its Arabic sense, the Quran decisively intervened, instructing believers to abandon the word entirely and to use *Unẓurnā*, a term equal in meaning but free from misuse.

This directive establishes an important legal and ethical principle: when a word or action is permissible in itself but becomes a means to wrongdoing or irreverence, it must be abandoned. Islamic law thus prioritises safeguarding faith and reverence through the principle of *sadd al-dharā ‘i* ‘ (blocking the means). Protecting the sanctity of the Prophet ﷺ and the clarity of belief takes precedence over retaining expressions susceptible to abuse.

Revering and honouring the Prophet Muḥammad ﷺ is a comprehensive obligation that shapes belief, speech and daily conduct. Through frequent *Ṣalāh* and *Salām*, dignified language and careful restraint from even subtle forms of disrespect, we reaffirm our love for the Messenger ﷺ and commitment to the values he embodied.

O Allah, send abundant blessings and peace upon our Prophet Muḥammad ﷺ, instil in our hearts true love and reverence for him and grant us the ability to honour him in our words, actions and character. Unite us under his banner on the Day of Resurrection. Āmīn.

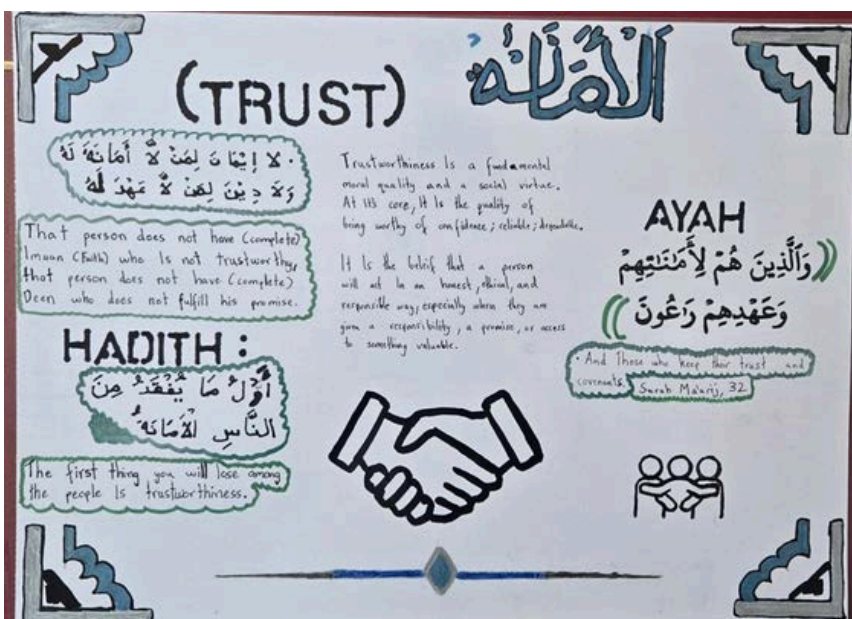
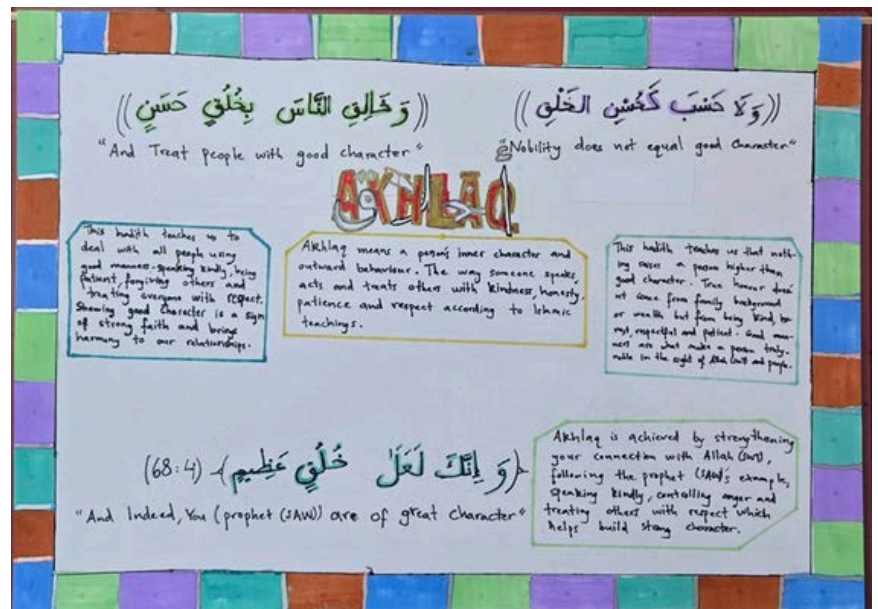
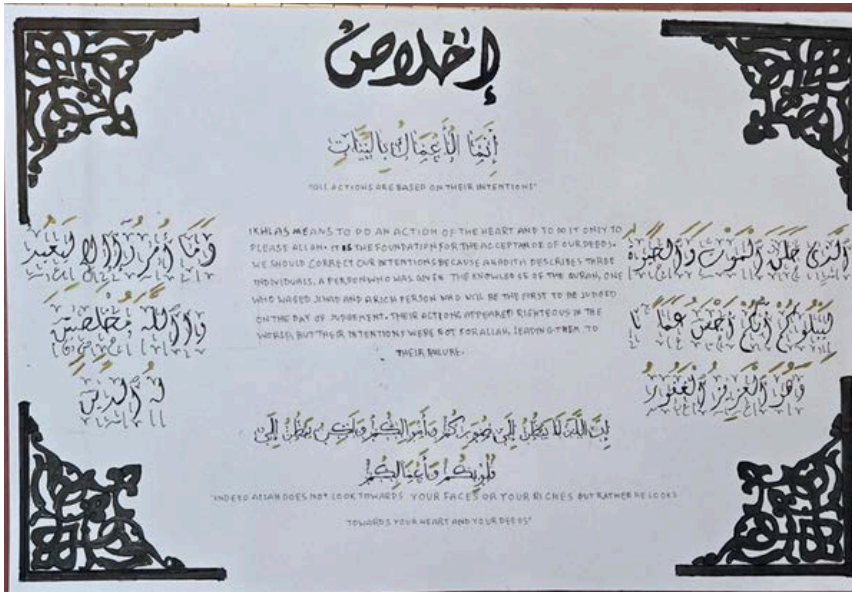
YEAR 8 POSTER PROJECT: LEARNING, REFLECTION & EVIDENCE

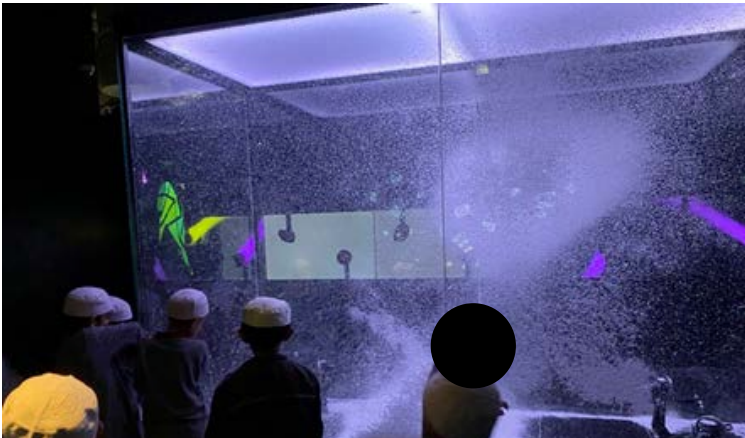
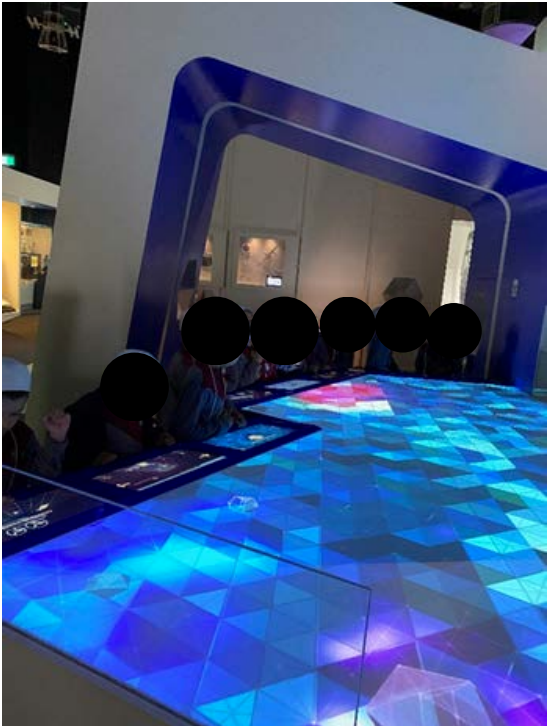
Both students and teachers had a wonderful day, and the excursion provided a valuable real-world context for students to apply their classroom learning and develop an early understanding of physical sciences.

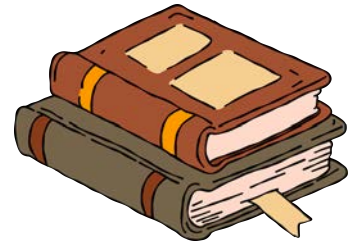

LAUNCH OF THE MINILIT PROGRAM – A READING INTERVENTION PROGRAM



In Term 3, our Year 1 and Year 2 classes have begun using the MiniLit program, an evidence-based reading intervention developed by Macquarie University. MiniLit is designed to provide targeted support for students who require additional help in developing essential reading skills, with a strong focus on phonics, fluency, and comprehension.

Throughout Term 3 and Term 4, our MiniLit staff have worked closely with small groups of students to deliver structured lessons in a supportive setting. Lessons focus on building decoding skills, practising high-frequency words, and developing confidence in reading connected texts. Regular monitoring and assessment ensure that instruction is responsive to student progress and individual needs.

We are already seeing students grow in confidence and enjoyment as they strengthen their reading skills. Thank you to our MiniLit staff for their dedication to supporting this important program. We look forward to seeing even more growth in our young readers!

Slime

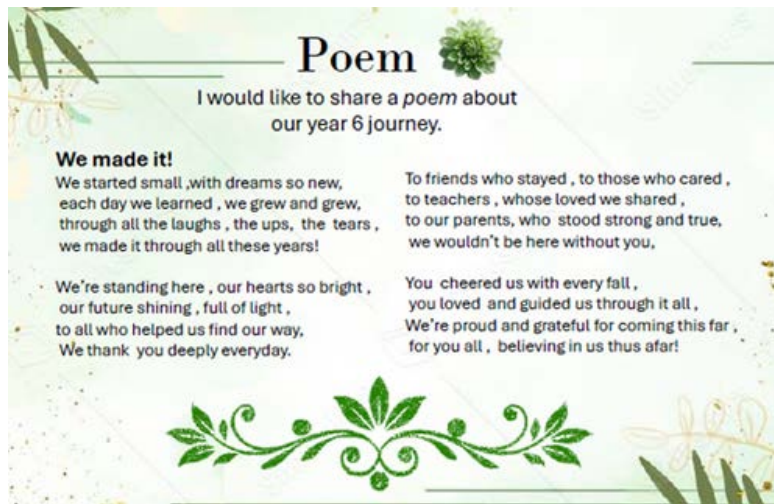

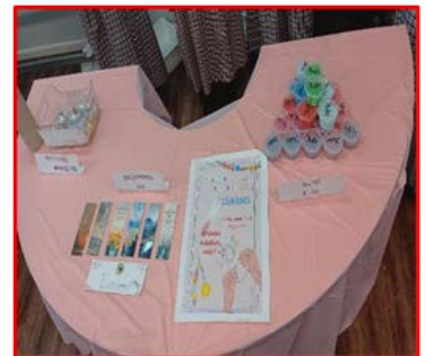
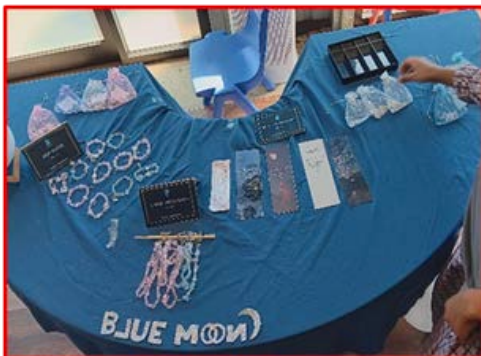
HUMANITIES DEPARTMENT:

Economics and Business -Term 3 Stall Day

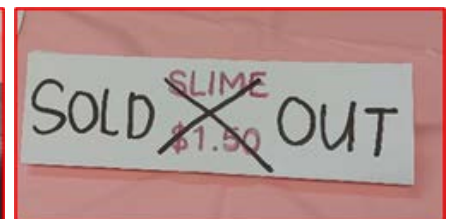
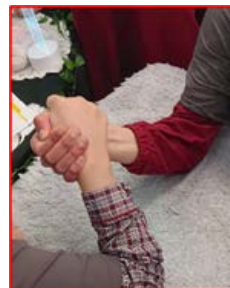

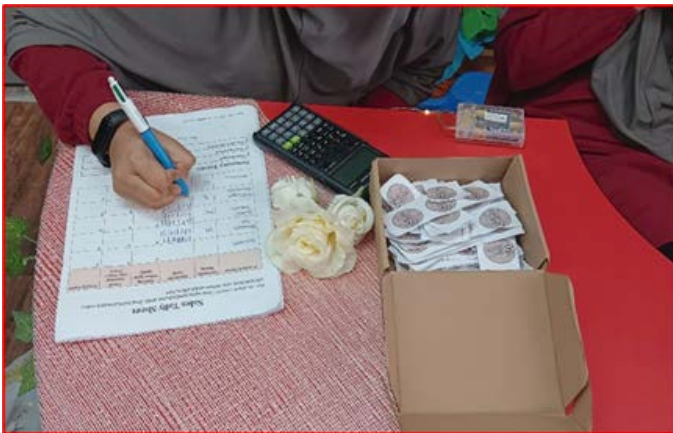
MINI BUSINESSES BUT MAJOR CREATIVITY!

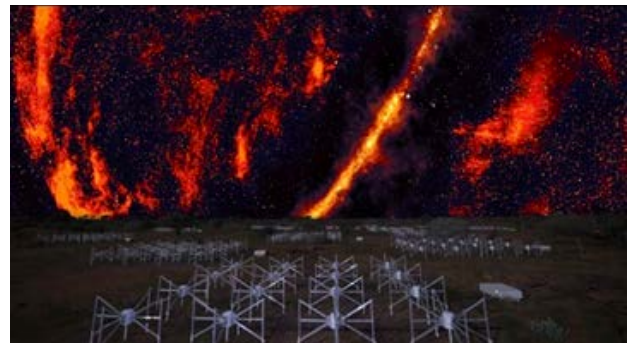
YEAR 10 PLANETARIUM EXCURSION

Year 10 students experienced a fulldome Planetarium experience in reclining seats. The show was about the awe-inspiring ways that scientists learn about our universe, showcasing Australian contributions to world-leading science. Students watched a 10-minute live, presenter-led guided tour of the night sky. Students learnt about how telescopes allow us to examine light in order to learn about our Universe. Students also learnt that astronomy can use optical light or other parts of the electromagnetic spectrum, such as radio waves. The show also showcased the SkyMapper telescope in New South Wales and the Murchison Wide-field Array (MWA) in Western Australia and how they are used to study the effects of dark energy and a glimpse into the early universe.

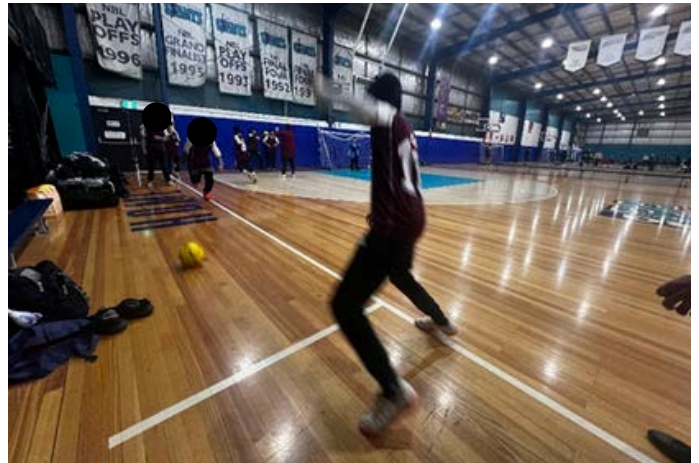
