(Islamic Advices)

A Productive Holiday

The annual school holidays will inevitably leave us with extra time where we have not reserved or chosen an activity to engage in. For students of knowledge unreserved and free time is gold with the condition that it is invested in the correct avenues. It can also serve as a source of destruction, especially that of divine knowledge, and the inner spirituality. The famous giant of knowledge Imam Shāfi'ī (May Allah \circledast have mercy upon him) stated: "If you do not engage the self (nafs) in acts of goodness, it will busy you in acts of evil and falsehood." Therefore, it is crucial that the free time is organised and scheduled in order to protect and enhance the learnt knowledge and achievements of the year.

The Companions of the Prophet # were known to be extremely generous with their wealth, but when it came to their time, they were extremely wise from spending it on non-productive activities. Ibn Mas' ألم عنه للمع نعم states that "I have not regretted more than the day where the sun sets and I know that my life has decreased, but my deeds have not increased". The Prophet # also informed us that free time is a great blessing, and people do not benefit from it as they should. He # states: "There are two blessings that many people are deceived into losing: health and free time" (Bukhari).

Improving the quality of our Prayers

I hereby call the readers to make their free time valuable by dedicating some time in their holidays to work on improving the quality of their prayers. This will ensure protection of the knowledge that they have attained throughout the year and make their holidays very productive.

Types of Prayers:

1. Key to Paradise

It has been mentioned by the Prophet *"Hat the "Key to paradise is prayer"* (Ahmad). The word 'key to paradise' is used in the hadīth, which signifies that it has to be a specific prayer, just like the door to our house can only be opened by a specific key, similarly there are many types of prayers in regards to how they are offered, and every prayer cannot unlock the door to paradise. It is none other than the prayer of the Prophet *"which is the key"*

to paradise. He ﷺ said: "Pray as you see me praying" (Bukhari & Muslim). His prayer was full of calmness and tranquility. Jābir رضي الله عنه reported that he (ﷺ) came to us and said: "How is it that I see you lifting your hands like the tails of headstrong horses? Be calm in prayer" (Muslim).

2. The Cursed Prayer

Some prayers are offered in such an unmindful manner that Allah has cursed them in the Quran. He says:

"So woe to those performers of salāh who are neglectful of their prayer, who (do good) only to show off" (Quran 107: 4-6)

3. Prayer of the Hypocrite

Some prayers are offered in such a hasty manner that the prophet # has termed it the prayer of the hypocrites. He # said: "That is the prayer of the hypocrites, that is the prayer of the hypocrites, that is the prayer of the hypocrites, that one of them sits until the sun becomes yellow and is between the two horns of satan. Then he stands and rattles off four cycles of prayer, he does not remember Allah in it, except a little". (Abu Dawud 413).

Prayer; a Beautiful Gift

Prayer is such a beautiful gift from Allah * presented to the Prophet * at the highest of the places and it consists of a posture, that immediately takes its performer close as we can ever get to Him. The Prophet * has stated: "The closest that the slave comes to his Lord is when he is prostrating, so supplicate to Allah excessively (in prostration)" (Muslim).

Forms of Worships included in Prayer

Salāh also has all the forms of worships enveloped within it. Hakīm ul Ummah; Sheikh Ashraf Ali Thanvi has mentioned that the prayer encompasses all forms of worships in it. He then mentions all forms of worships and explains how they are incorporated in Salāh. This means that when one performs Salāh, all acts of worships are also performed, and thus he reaps the rewards and blessings of them in prayer. Its example is like having a mixture of vitamins that is a combination of all the vitamins and minerals, it is easier and more beneficial to consume than consuming each vitamin individually. Similarly, Salāh encompasses fasting, hajj, i'tikāf, zikr and recitation of the Quran. By praying one attains the blessings of all these actions also. The following worships are included in prayer.

- Zikr (remembrance) of Allah: this is performed when transiting from posture to another we say Allahu Akbar, and also in between the postures we are
 commanded to recite Subhana Rabial Ala, and in the hadīth it is mentioned that Subhanallah and Alhamdulillah fills the scale (Muslim).
- 2. **Tilawah (recital) of the Quran:** The Quran is also recited in the prayer,

the Prophet ﷺ said "He who does not recite the opening of the book is not credited with having observed prayer" (Bukhari & Muslim).

- 3. **Fasting:** Usually the fast of Ramadan is nullified by eating or drinking, as for prayer it is not only nullified by eating or drinking, it is also nullified by talking or excessive movement unnecessarily. Which means we observe a higher degree of fast during prayer than the fast of Ramadān.
- 4. **Hajj:** The purpose of Hajj is to have a connection with the Ka'bah, and in prayer we are ordered to face the Ka'bah, hence a connection is made.
- 5. **Zakah (spending in charity):** The purpose of charity is to spend in the path of Allah, and when we spend on our clothes, so that they meet the requirements of prayer, we have spent in the path of Allah.
- 6. Salutations on the Prophet *****: Whilst sitting down for the last sitting in prayer, we are ordered to send salutations to the Prophet *****.
- 7. **Du'a (supplication):** Before concluding the prayer we are ordered to supplicate to our Lord, and the Prophet [#] has encouraged us to supplicate to Him in prostration.
- 8. I'tikāf (Observing a private devotion in the Mosque): The purpose of I'tikāf is to abandon sins, the Prophet said about one who observes a period of I'tikāf in a mosque, "He turns away from sins and is rewarded for good deeds like one who does all good deeds" (Ibn Mājah).
- 9. Qurbān (the sacrificing of an animal): The purpose of qurbān is sacrificing one's desires for the sake of Allah, and in Salāh, we confine our thoughts, glances and movements for the pleasure of Allah .®This cannot be achieved except by abandoning the desires.
- 10.**Mentioning the pious:** Whilst in salāh we even make mention of the pious, which is also rewarding. When we recite ٱنْعَمْتَ عَلَيْهِمْ those that you have blessed" (Quran: 1:6).

The virtues and rewards of each of the above acts have been mentioned in the hadīth and they are all enveloped within Sālāh. The performer of prayer gleans the benefits and blessings of all the above actions.

First matter to be asked about

This is why the Prophet # has stated: "The first of man's deeds for which he will be called to account on the Day of Resurrection will be Salat. If it is found to be perfect, he will be safe and successful; but if it is incomplete, he will be unfortunate and a loser. If any shortcoming is found in the obligatory Salat, the Glorious and Exalted Lord will command to see whether His slave has offered any voluntary Salat so that the obligatory Salat may be made up by it. Then the rest

of his actions will be treated in the same manner" (Tirmīdhī). Allah [®]has stated in the Quran: "Certainly prayer prevents from immorality and evil" (Quran 29:45). Therefore, prayer can be a means of protection from evil deeds.

How to improve one's prayer?

We can work on our prayers from many dimensions. The following are some of the dimensions we should strive to achieve in our prayer so that it becomes a key to paradise and stops us from evil.

- 1. All postures of prayer resemble the postures of the Prophet *****: To achieve this, we must approach the scholars of dīn and ask them to observe and rectify our prayers. (Tarbiyah teachers at Al Iman College observed the wudhū and prayers of the students during the year).
- 2. To pray with devotion inwardly: To achieve this we must:

<u>a)Prepare for it before its time:</u> All the devotion of prayer starts from the time of wudhū. One should perfectly perform his wudhū'.

<u>b)Pray like it is our last prayer:</u> The Prophet ﷺalso advised us to pray each prayer as it is the last.

<u>c) Concentrate on the wordings of the prayer and its meanings:</u> The scholars have advised that by concentrating on the pronunciation of the utterances in the prayer we can achieve inward devotion in prayer.

- **3. To pray regularly with congregation:** The Prophet stated "Prayer offered in a congregation is twenty-seven degrees more excellent than prayer said by a single person" (Bukhari & Muslim).
- 4. To pray excessively: This can be done by praying all the various types of optional prayers throughout the day, such as the Tahajjud (night) Prayer, Ishrāq Prayer, Duhā Prayer, the 12 emphasised Sunnah Prayers, Salātul-Hājah, Salātul-Istikhārah, Tahayyatul-Masjid, and Tahayyatul-Wudhū etc.

By the grace of Allah [®] if we are given the ability to follow the above tasks, Allah [®]will improve the quality of our prayers, our holidays will surely become productive and above all, our prayers will become a means to connect to Allah [®] and a key to Paradise.

IMPORTANCE OF THE 'MOTHER TONGUE' IN EDUCATION.

Mother tongue, it is not just a language we speak at home, it is an identity of the place and culture we come from and belong.

A child first comprehends everything they see around them, the people, the actions, the language and the culture. It is during this stage that the foundations for understanding, learning and literacy are established.

Learning a language that is often spoken at home is an important aspect of a child's growth as it helps them understand or guess the words of a second language just through context. This ability is only possible if the child has learnt a native language or a mother tongue at a very early age.

When a child is continuously exposed to a certain language from the time of their birth, they tend to pick up words and their meaning just by the tone in which they are said and the context. This helps form a memory in the brain, a word that is connected to a tone and an emotion. Since the brain is still developing, it forms the base for all further learning and development.

Learning a new language with a background of mother tongue helps in improving capabilities of critical thinking and increased vocabulary. It is these skill that they take with them into formal education. Being brought up with a mother tongue allows the child to develop deeper understanding on how to form sentences and expressions making the study of a second language at school easier.

Mother tongue also helps in connecting to their grandparents or parents who may or may not be familiar with other languages.

We live a world where everything is virtual, mother tongue is something that will help in creating a warmer experience even in this virtual world.

Lastly, knowing more than one language helps in increasing the cognitive ability of a child at a very early age and in turn helps with the overall growth and development of children.

Year 5A Terrarium Project Mini Garden in a Bottle

In this project students researched about the landscaper occupation and worked as landscapers in all steps from their initial plan, their terrarium design to understanding terrariums science, types of plant suitable for their design and regular observation of their terrarium. Students enjoyed working as a landscaper to make their own terrariums and was able to reflect that a terrarium does not need regular watering like a garden. It has its own water cycle where the water is constantly being recycled. The sun causes the water in the soil to evaporate which causes droplets or condensation on the walls which trickle back down to the soil. Occasionally, if the soil is looking dry and the plants look a little 'sad', you will need to spray in some more water.

Year 9 students had an engineering challenge to solve a third world country problem. Students were tasked to create a solar oven for those who do not have access to gas or electricity for cooking.

Many people around the world don't have access to electricity or gas. To cook their food, they often need to collect wood and light a fire. The smoke produced by cooking fires can cause serious health problems, especially for women and children.

Students had to choose their materials wisely based on what they learnt from topics on conduction, convection and radiation. Students then had to test their solar ovens by cooking something simple like melting cheese or chocolate. 
