AL-NASIHAH THE BEAUTY AND PURPOSE OF AADAAB (ISLAMIC ETIQUETTES) IN ISLAM

Seeking, learning, and acquiring knowledge of Islam is among the Countless scholars throughout Islamic history have authored books dedicated to Islamic conduct (adab), manners, and teachings—an enduring testimony to the significance of good character in Islam. These writings cover a wide array of etiquettes: the adaab of eating, drinking, visiting, greeting, offering condolences, and even writing letters. Each of these etiquettes are derived either directly from the Qur'an and Hadith, or extracted through their interpretation, highlighting the importance of refined behaviour in every aspect of a Muslim's life.

Remarkably, the Qur'an, while not detailing the number of units (rak'āt) in the five daily prayers, explicitly outlines the etiquette of visiting someone's home. This prioritisation reflects the importance of good conduct in the sight of Allah Almighty.

'O you who believe, do not enter any houses, other than your own houses unless you seek permission and greet their inmates with Salam. That is good for you, so that you may be heedful. But if you do not find any one therein, then do not enter them until permission is given to you; and if it is said to you: Go back, then go back; this is purer for you; and Allah is Cognizant of what you do.'

(Quran 24: 27-28)



Elsewhere, Allah Almighty commands even children and servants to seek permission at certain times, reflecting how Islam values privacy, decency, and mutual respect:

'O you who believe, the slaves owned by you, and those of you who have not reached puberty, must seek your permission (to see you) at three times: before the prayer of Fajr, and when you take off your clothes at noon, and after the prayer of _Isha '. These are three times of privacy for you. There is no harm, neither to you nor to them, after these (three times). They are your frequent visitors, as some of you are (frequent visitors) of the others. This is how Allah explains the verses to you. Allah is All-Knowing, All-Wise.' (Quran 24: 58)

Why are Aadaab So Heavily Emphasised?

There are two fundamental reasons:

- 1. It is is the Sunnah of the Prophet **Sec**. Following his way earns the pleasure of Allah and leads to success in both worlds.
- 2. It creates comfort and harmony, as beautifully explained by Hakīm al-Ummah, Shaykh Ashraf 'Alī Thānvī (رحمه الله). The Prophet ﷺ defined a true Muslim as one from whose tongue and hands others are safe. Thus, the etiquettes outlined in Islam serve the purpose of preventing harm and creating ease and comfort in society.

The Prophet ﷺ actively encouraged practices that promoted personal and communal comfort. He would seek refuge from chaos and disorder [1] and advised removing shoes before eating for greater ease [2]. He ﷺ discouraged actions such as walking while only wearing one shoe, he advised either to wear both or remove both [3].

Even the etiquette around greetings shows a deep concern for not burdening others.

For example:

- It is discouraged to greet someone performing ablution or immersed in dhikr.
- It is against the Sunnah to loudly say Salām when entering a masjid, as others may be praying, reading Qur'an, or making duʿā.
- Greeting someone who is eating is disliked as it may cause them discomfort if they feel obliged to respond immediately.



Islamic scholars [Fatawa Hindiyah] have noted that light and pleasant conversation is preferred during meals—such as narrating stories of the Prophets —so as not to burden the mind or heart. Even in matters of learning and teaching, the Prophet ﷺ would always choose what was easiest when presented with options, as long as it was not sinful.

Every aspect of Islamic etiquette—whether related to speech, food, prayer, or interaction—has been designed for our benefit and ease. These etiquettes are not arbitrary rituals; they are compassionate guidelines meant to bring peace, comfort, and harmony to our lives and the lives of others.

As we practice and teach adab, let us always remember the spirit behind it: to please Allah and to be a source of ease and mercy for others. Let this principle guide our actions, decisions, and interactions, just as it did for our Prophet ﷺ—a mercy to all the worlds.

"Whenever the Prophet ﷺ was given a choice between two matters, he would choose the easier of the two, as long as it was not sinful." (Bukhari & Muslim)

The safety and wellbeing of our students extend beyond the school gates; it starts in the home and continues into every area of their daily lives. As parents and guardians, your ongoing involvement plays a vital role in guiding and protecting your child. Below are some important safety and wellbeing reminders to help support your child at school, at home, and in the community:

- **Travel Safety Bicycles, Scooters, and E-Bikes:** Please remind your children to always wear appropriate safety gear, such as helmets and knee/elbow pads, when using bicycles, skateboards, scooters, or electric bikes. Ensure they understand the importance of following road rules, avoiding busy streets, and being alert to their surroundings when travelling to and from school.

MENTAL ILLNESS DOES NOT HAVE A SIZE



Assalamu Alaikum,

As the school counsellor, one of my main priorities is to ensure that every student in our school feels safe, supported, and valued — not only physically, but emotionally and mentally as well.

In our community, we often look for signs we can see with our eyes. But mental illness doesn't always come with visible symptoms. It doesn't have a "size." It doesn't look a certain way. A student who appears happy may still be struggling. A student who is quiet may be fighting a private battle.

Just as our Islam teaches us to care for our physical health, it also reminds us of the importance of emotional and mental well-being.

The Prophet Muhammad Sallallahu Alaihi Wasallam said:

"Indeed, in the body there is a piece of flesh which, if it is sound, the whole body is sound... Verily it is the heart." (Bukhari & Muslim)

This includes our emotional heart — our mental and spiritual wellness.



What Does "Mental Illness Does NOT Have a Size" Mean?

It means we shouldn't judge someone's pain by how "big" or "small" it looks to us. Everyone's struggle is unique. Telling someone to "just be grateful" or "get over it" can close the doors to healing.

Mental health challenges can affect anyone — regardless of age, background, achievements, or how religious they appear. Even the most pious companions of the Prophet ﷺ experienced moments of sadness, anxiety, and stress. Feeling low is not a sign of weak faith; seeking help is a sign of strength and wisdom.

A Message to Our Students:

If you're feeling overwhelmed, anxious, sad, or not quite yourself, know this:

- You are not alone.
- Your feelings are valid.
- Islam encourages us to seek help and take care of our hearts.

Whether it's something big or small, I am here for you. You don't need to have all the answers. You don't need to suffer in silence. Speaking to someone is the first step toward healing — and that is brave.

A Message to Parents and Teachers:

Please remember, mental illness does not always show itself clearly. Changes in sleep, appetite, social behaviour, or academic performance can be signs that a child is struggling.

Let us work together to build a school culture where our students feel:

- Emotionally safe
- Comfortable seeking help
- Respected without judgment

Our beloved Prophet as was the best listener, the most compassionate companion, and the safest space for his people. Let us follow that example in our school by ensuring that every child feels heard, seen, and supported — no matter what they are going through.

YEAR 3 - 6 DEPARTMENT YEAR 3 VISIT TO MELBOURNE MUSEUM – EXPLORING WEATHER, CLIMATE AND HUMAN IMPACTS

Our enthusiastic Year 3 students recently had the opportunity to visit the Melbourne Museum as part of their learning on Weather, Climate and Human Impacts, which links to the Year 3 Science and HASS curriculum.

Throughout the day, students explored a variety of fascinating museum galleries, including:

- Dynamic Earth, where they learned about natural forces that shape our planet
- Forest Gallery, which showcased Australia's unique ecosystems and biodiversity
- Bugs Alive!, where students discovered the important role of insects in environmental balance
- First Peoples Exhibition, helping students understand the deep connection Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have with Country and climate

These hands-on exhibits helped students investigate the difference between weather and climate, understand how natural events and human activities impact the environment, and reflect on how we can all play a part in caring for our planet.

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YEAR 6 HISTORY EXCURSION

Year 6 students went on an incredible excursion journey in Term 2. As part of their learning, they were given the opportunity to experience about the early explorers and founding settlers on the Birrarung or Yarra Yarra River and the events that led to a settlement in defiance of British law.

Students visited landmarks that tell stories of the colonisation period such as settlement explorer locations, Indigenous, shipping, gold rush, Eureka, Marvellous Melbourne.

During the tour each student assumed an early Melbourne identity and viewed early paintings, maps, and documents e.g. historic pictures, timelines. Students also discovered the impact of settlers on the Indigenous people and landscapes of the Kulin Nation.

Immigration Museum:

As part of their history excursion, Year 6 students visited Immigration Museum as well. They learned about Australian immigration history and stories of immigrants using artefacts and objects from the museum collection.

Students experienced:

- Exploring museum objects, artefacts and documents to discover immigration stories.
- Recognising challenges immigrants face.
- Working in small groups and sharing ideas with peers.
- Reporting back findings to the class.
- A visit to the museum galleries after the staff led education program to build on the information discovered in the classroom session.

YEAR 7 - 10 DEPARTMENT: TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT: YEAR 7 & 8 NEW TEXTILE AND ELECTRONICS CURRICULUM ENGAGE STUDENTS IN TERM 2

In Term 2, AIC students were offered two new areas in Design and Technology program. Year 7 students learned about fibres and textiles, with a focus on fibre production and types of fabrics, fundamental textile skills including hand stitching, fabric cutting, operating a sewing machine, and fabric painting. As their major assessment, students were tasked with designing and creating either a bag or a cushion cover. They developed mood boards to visually present their inspiration and design ideas. They then planned and executed their final product using either hand stitching or a sewing machine, learning to upcycle used clothing in creative ways.

Year 8 students learned about engineering principles and systems through engagement with electronics. They learned about the working of basic electronic circuits and how to apply them to design a gadget, with many students able to create lighting systems and smart devices that activate on touch.

Through their exploration of the design process from concept to creation, students were able to build technical skills and developed confidence in their ability to bring ideas to life. Hands-on experiences like this foster innovation, creativity, safe operation of tools, problem-solving skills, and awareness about sustainability.

MATHS DEPARTMENT: BIG WIN IN THE EP MATHS CHAMPIONSHIP FOR AIC SECONDARY STUDENTS AND GRIN PROGRAM

Year 7-12 students had the opportunity to show their enthusiasm and love for Mathematics during Term 2 when AIC participated in Education Perfect (EP) International Mathematics Championship. Together AIC secondary students solve more than 50,000 questions and earned more than 40,000 points, which placed AIC at #3 place in all Victorian schools and 18th globally.

While this competition is voluntary participation based and not as glamorous as International Maths Olympiads (which one day we aim to participate in, inshaAllah), we recognise the enthusiasm, participation and efforts put in by our students, who collectively earned 10 honours awards. Each of these students were awarded with a special lunch, a certificate and a book award from the school. Congratulations and well done, boys and girls!

To help all students with maths, parents are kindly requested to celebrate their child's participation and engagement with maths by showing an interest in maths in their conversation with children as well as connect maths ideas to day-to-day activities, such as shopping, cooking or planning for a trip etc. During the school holidays, secondary students should revise the content and work on any weak areas (homework has been allocated).

Particularly with those students who struggle with maths, AIC started a special tutoring program called GRIN (Getting Ready in Numeracy). Parents are kindly requested to encourage these students and ensure that they continue to work on their foundational maths skills over the holidays.
