RIGHTS OF PROPHET MUHAMMAD 鑑 – PART 1

The most significant and honoured person to ever set foot on this earth is our beloved Prophet Muhammad ... He was not only the leader of his nation, but also the leader of all the Prophets and Messengers of Allah (peace be upon them all).

Just as Islam has established rights for all beings and relationships—such as the rights of Allah pover His creation, the rights of parents over their children, the rights of spouses over each other, the rights of neighbours, and even the rights of a travel companion—likewise has Islam placed rights of the Prophet population upon mankind. The greater a person's importance in our lives, the greater are the rights they hold over us. Since after Allah photostrant figure in the life of every Muslim is the Prophet Muhammad photostrant, his rights upon us are immense and binding.

Among the many rights of the Prophet ﷺ, I would like to highlight four that every believer should reflect upon and strive to implement in their lives.

The First Right: To Believe in Him

The foremost right of the Prophet sis to have complete faith in him. Every Muslim must firmly believe that Muhammad sis the final Prophet, the last Messenger, and the Seal of the Prophets. Allah has declared in the Qur'an:

"Muhammad is not the father of any of your men, but he is the Messenger of Allah and the Seal of the Prophets. And Allah is All-Knowing of everything."

(Quran 33:40)

In a narration, the Prophet see explained:

"My similitude in comparison with the other Prophets before me is that of a man who has built a house nicely and beautifully, except for a place of one brick in a corner. The people go about it and wonder at its beauty but say:

'Would that this brick be put in its place!' So I am that brick,
and I am the last of the Prophets."

(Bukhari)



Sayyiduna Abu Huraira (may Allah be pleased with him) reported the Messenger as saying:

"I have been given superiority over the Prophets in six respects: I have been given words which are concise but comprehensive in meaning; I have been helped by awe [cast into the hearts of enemies]; war spoils have been made lawful to me; the earth has been made for me a place of worship and a means of purification; I have been sent to all mankind; and the line of Prophets is closed with me."

(Muslim)

Sayyiduna Jubair ibn Mut'im (may Allah be pleased with him) narrated that he heard the Prophet say:

"I have names: I am Muhammad, I am Ahmad, I am al-Māhī (the obliterator) by whom Allah obliterates disbelief, I am al-Hāshir (the gatherer) who will gather mankind at my feet, and I am al-'Āqib (the last in succession), al-'Āqib being the one after whom there will be no Prophet."

(Bukhari & Muslim)

Sayyiduna Anas ibn Malik (may Allah be pleased with him) narrated: The Messenger of Allah said:

"Indeed Messengership and Prophethood have been terminated, so there shall be no Messenger after me, nor any Prophet."

(Tirmidhi)

During the expedition of Tabook, when the Prophet sappointed Sayyiduna Ali (may Allah be pleased with him) to remain behind in Madinah to look after the affairs of the women and children, Ali (may Allah be pleased with him) said, "Do you want to leave me with the children and women?" The Prophet says replied:

"Will you not be pleased that you will be to me like Harun was to Musa? But there will be no Prophet after me."

(Bukhari)

The duty of a Prophet is to convey and establish the commandments of Allah Most High. A new law is only revealed or an earlier one abrogated through a Messenger. Now that Prophet Muhammad si is the final Messenger, no divine law will ever be abrogated or replaced. The Sharia



"Today I have perfected your religion for you, completed My blessing upon you, and chosen Islam as your religion"

(Quran 5:3)

The Relevance of the Sunnah for All Times

It is a grave mistake to assume that the Sunnah of the Prophet so was only relevant for the companions and their era, and that it holds no practicality in our so-called "modern" times. Such a belief not only undermines the timelessness of his guidance, but it also contradicts the very purpose of his Prophethood, which was to be a mercy for all of mankind until the end of time.

The Sunnah is not bound by centuries or cultures; it is divinely preserved, eternally relevant, and perpetually practical. The way of the Prophet provides guidance for every generation, every society, and every circumstance until the Day of Judgment. His blessed example offers light for the seeker of truth in every age—whether in the deserts of Arabia or the metropolises of the twenty-first century. The great scholar Shah Abdul Aziz Muhaddith Dehlawi (حمه الله) profoundly warned:

"Whoever belittles the Sunnah, or regards it as insignificant, and shows laziness in practicing it, will be punished by being deprived of the strength and ability to perform the obligatory acts (farā'id)."

As we prepare to welcome our students back for Term 4, it's a good time to remind ourselves of the importance of healthy routines and proper rest. Our faith teaches us that sleep is a blessing from Allah Subhanahoo Wata'ala and that caring for our bodies is part of our responsibility as Muslims.

With school officially starting back on **Tuesday, 7th October, for students**, it's important that we, as parents, begin to support and encourage our children to adjust their bedtime and wake-up times a few days before. COMING SOON — ROAD SMART INTERACTIVE INCURSION (YR 9–11)



We are excited to announce that Road Smart Interactive will be visiting our school on Monday, the 20th, and Tuesday, the 21st of October (Term 4, Week 3). This immersive incursion is designed especially for our Years 9–11 students to deepen their understanding of road safety through engaging, hands-on experiences.

What is Road Smart Interactive?

- Developed by road safety experts and educational specialists, this program uses immersive and digital tools to bring road safety lessons to life.
- It draws from elements of the award-winning Road to Zero Experience Space at Melbourne Museum and is led by experienced facilitators.
- Students will work through interactive digital experiences, each focusing on a different aspect of road safety (e.g. decision-making, hazard perception, consequences, laws, vehicle dynamics).
- The team provides full setup of equipment and experiences on site, and includes supporting resources for teachers and schools to use before and after the incursion.
- The design allows for multiple year levels across the two days, so the program can be delivered to all participating classes.



Why this matters

As our students reach driving age and interact more with roads, bridges, and transport, understanding risks, decision-making, and safe behaviour becomes vital. This incursion aligns with our commitment to student wellbeing and safety, it's not just about passing rules, but building awareness, responsibility, and confident, informed choices.

What students will gain:

- Hands-on, memorable learning via VR / immersive technology
- Practical perspectives on road safety beyond textbooks
- · Reinforcement of safe behaviour in real life
- Resources teachers can use to continue conversations before and after the incursion

We look forward to this program in October and believe it will be a meaningful and engaging experience for our students. More details about times, classes, and logistics will follow soon in the weeks ahead.

























YEAR 2 INCURSION: HISTORY BOX – BLAST FROM THE PAST




Stepping Into the Past - Market

Students discovered:


- Clothes from the past



YEAR 3'S INCURSION ABOUT HEAT ENERGY


In Term 3, our Grade 3 students had an exciting science incursion all about heat energy. The session introduced the different ways heat can move: conduction, convection, and radiation, and helped students explore the difference between conductors and insulators.

Through a series of hands-on experiments, students discovered how heat travels through different materials. They tested objects to see which ones allowed heat to pass quickly (conductors, like metal) and which ones slowed the transfer of heat (insulators, like wood or plastic).



One of the highlights of the incursion was using an infrared camera. This allowed students to actually see heat as colours on a screen, showing changes in temperature caused by radiation. The activity helped them connect what they were learning with real-world applications, such as how heat is transferred from the sun or why some materials feel warmer than others.

The incursion sparked lots of curiosity and questions. Students were amazed to see science come alive and enjoyed learning through experiments, observation, and technology. This hands-on experience not only deepened their understanding of heat but also inspired them to think like real scientists!

Humanities Presentations











Science Electricity Practicals

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT:

YEAR 8 EXPLORING CELLS AND BODY SYSTEMS

This term, Year 8 students have been on an exciting journey into the microscopic world of cells and the fascinating complexity of human body systems. Their curiosity, creativity, and hands-on learning have made this a wonderful unit of discovery.

Mastering the Microscope

Students began by learning the parts of the microscope and how to use it effectively. They quickly developed skills in focusing and adjusting, allowing them to observe detailed specimens of plant and animal cells. Seeing the structures they had studied in theory come to life under the lens was a highlight for many!


Scientific Writing

Alongside practical work, students have been building their skills in writing lab reports, learning how to record observations, structure results, and draw evidence-based conclusions. This has strengthened both their understanding of science and their ability to communicate like real scientists.

****** Plant and Animal Cells

In class, we compared the structures of plant and animal cells, identifying key similarities and differences such as the presence of cell walls and chloroplasts in plants. To deepen this understanding, students used a range of creative materials and resources to design and build 3D models of cells. From edible cake cells to colourful clay models, their imagination brought the microscopic world to life in fun and memorable ways.























Body Systems in Focus

Building on their study of cells, Year 8 also explored how cells work together to form tissues, organs, and ultimately, body systems. They examined systems such as:

- The circulatory system understanding the vital role of the heart and blood vessels.
- The respiratory system learning how oxygen travels into the body and carbon dioxide is expelled.
- The digestive system which turns food into the energy that powers every cell.












† Looking Ahead


SCIENCE WEEK – SECONDARY TEAM QUIZ
