The Victorian Government has introduced new measures across metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shire to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).

Based on advice from the Victorian Chief Health Officer, the Victorian Government announced that everyone over the age of 12 in metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shire must wear a face covering when they leave their home for one of four reasons:

- study or work if you cannot work from home
- medical care and caregiving
- shopping for essentials
- daily exercise.

This means school-based staff and secondary school students over the age of 12 in Melbourne and Mitchell Shire must wear a face covering, including when travelling to and from school.

Premier Mr Andrews recognised the return to home learning would be challenging, particularly for parents of young children.

Let us turn this test into a blessing in disguise by being more obedient to Allah Subhanahoo Wata'ala. Assalamualiakum wa rehmatullahi wa barakatuhu Dear Parents/Guardians,






The third challenge for the boys was to decorate the class for the Eid. And, they nailed it. Spot on, boys! Masha Allah






The fourth challenge was to make an advertisement for their class and write a persuasive essay to convince a new student to join their class. Guess, who got convinced?




Islamic Calligraphy


Humanities Project:


"We are not makers of History. We are made by History" - Martin Luther King, Jr.



Mathematics Department

More AIC students engaged in interactive online Mathematics learning in Term 2

Since the beginning of Term 2, most students have been learning from home using an online setting to prevent the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). The Mathematics department together with the full support of our IT Department has embraced this online learning challenge through the use of interactive online learning resources namely Mathletics. As a result, it was observed that

- 1. Male secondary students spent 70% more time in Mathletics online learning in Term 2 compared to Term 1.
- 2. Remarkably, they achieved 15% more points (10 points are awarded for each correct answer) for every minute they sign into Mathletics in Term 2 compared to Term 1.

Students who achieved exemplary outcomes were recognized for their online efforts by presenting them with tokens of motivation. It is hope that this will spur more participation and better outcomes from students in the near future. Nevertheless, we should not forget that the mere presence of technology, however, does not guarantee improved teaching or learning. The challenge for teachers and students, therefore, is to support each other on formulating an effective and efficient strategy to utilize technology for improved learning outcomes in mathematics.
